A BRIEF *on the* CHURCH SEASON *of* ADVENT

The celebration of the season of Advent (which begins on the fourth Sunday before Christmas day) dates back to the fourth century. It is a time that focuses our attention on Jesus Christ's birth and ministry as well as his Second Coming when he will return to redeem all of creation and rule with all power and authority. Since we can't anticipate the day or the hour of Christ's return, we are filled with both a sense of joyful expectation and humble reverence, with our spiritual focus being on lives of prayer and preparation. The church has used the season of Advent (which means "coming" or "arrival") to focus and reflect on the particular themes of John the Baptist's preparation for the ministry of Christ, the annunciation to Mary that she would be the mother of Jesus, Christ's entry into Jerusalem, and the final judgment. Throughout the season we are constantly reminded that Jesus Christ is the Savior of the world.

Historically, the primary sanctuary color of Advent is purple, the color of royalty, to welcome the coming of the King. This points to the important connection between Jesus' birth and death. The nativity and the Incarnation cannot be separated from the crucifixion and the Atonement.

One way that many mark the time of this season is with the Advent wreath. The evergreens help to symbolize the new and everlasting life brought through Jesus Christ. The wreath consists of five candles; four candles around the wreath and one white candle in the center. One candle is lit the first Sunday of Advent, two are lit the second Sunday, and so on. The light progressively reminds us that Jesus is the light of the world that comes into the darkness of our lives to bring newness, life, and hope (Isa 42:6). Each of the candles usually has a special theme and color. For us the first candle is the Prophecy candle; the second is the Bethlehem candle; the third is the Angels candle, the fourth is the Shepherd candle; and the center white candle is the Christ candle, lit on Christmas. As we move through the weeks of advent we will examine more fully the stories connected to each candle basking in the light of his face shining upon us.



PRELUDE *to this* DEVOTIONAL

When the Heavens start singing, we'd better pay attention...

Christ's birth was a slow burn across the ancient horizons. For 400 years, since the prophet Malachi anticipated the rise of his healing wings across the sky (Mal 4:2), the deep silence of space had been empty of all signs of a redemptive melody. The Magi (Matthew 2), seeing the first stirrings of creation's new birth, began making preparations for their historic journey... to attend this, the opening overture of the New Covenant.

The Birth of Jesus, God's Son, is truly the greatest feat and noblest symphony the heavens or earth have ever witnessed. Never have the heavens or earth displayed such a skillful harmony as in the time of Jesus' birth. In the coming weeks we will explore the riches of this narrative through a few key themes which in chorus help to illuminate the manager scene.

First, we will examine the background story. We will do some research into the family of Jesus, and see what the many quotes from the Old Testament reveal to us. Second, we will get to know some of the major players who traveled long distances to be present for the big event. Who were they? And what were they doing? Third, we will explore the songs about Christ's birth. Why were there so many of them? What do they have to tell us about singing praises to our Lord during this time of year? Fourth, we will explore the darker underbelly of the Christmas story. Long before Jesus' pilgrimage to the sufferings of the cruel cross, his story was fraught with sorrow and struggle. This reminds us that in the yearly glamour of tinsel, Hollywood blockbusters, and freshly wrapped presents we still long for the greater glory of Jesus' return.



HOW TO USE *this* DEVOTIONAL

We designed this devotional as a way to help you, Christ's worshiping community, think about Advent themes during the entire month—not just on the four Sundays leading up to Christmas.

Each individual devotion contains a passage of Scripture, a brief reflection on that passage, sample prayers to guide the prayers of children and adults, and hymns to sing together to give voice to your praises and longings.

The devotional was designed to be read in community. So, whether you have a large family or live alone, we encourage you to find one or two (or more) others and go through these devotions together during a time of family devotions, after a meal, or over the phone. Read the Scriptures and pray together. And sing the songs together as well. (If you can't read music, you can find many of the tunes either on iTunes or by doing an online search of the hymn's title.)



WEEK ONE of ADVENT

Background #1 - The Story of Jesus' Coming Starts in the Old Testament

The story of Jesus' birth began centuries before his father and mother (Mary and Joseph) knew him. The Hebrew people had long been expecting a Messiah—the anointed one who would come and rescue them from the sin and misery of the world. Their prophets, the prophets of our own Old Testament, had long foretold of one to come who would break the hardness of God's people's hearts and bring everlasting peace. During this first week of Advent we will look at a few of these verses as a way to give us context—to help us to see ourselves in the midst of this story—as we ourselves journey with the Magi to the humble manger scene.

Matthew 1:18-35

18Now the birth of Jesus Christ took place in this way. When his mother Mary had been betrothed to Joseph, before they came together she was found to be with child from the Holy Spirit. 19And her husband Joseph, being a just man and unwilling to put her to shame, resolved to divorce her quietly. 20But as he considered these things, behold, an angel of the Lord appeared to him in a dream, saying, "Joseph, son of David, do not fear to take Mary as your wife, for that which is conceived in her is from the Holy Spirit. 21She will bear a son, and you shall call his name Jesus, for he will save his people from their sins." 22All this took place to fulfill what the Lord had spoken by the prophet:

*23"Behold, the virgin shall conceive and bear a son,
and they shall call his name Immanuel"*

(which means, God with us). 24When Joseph woke from sleep, he did as the angel of the Lord commanded him: he took his wife, 25but knew her not until she had given birth to a son. And he called his name Jesus.

Shedding some light...

The story of Jesus' birth is about God showing that he keeps his promises and is trustworthy. How can we honor the story of Jesus' birth this week by keeping our promises and our word?

Children's Prayer

Jesus, help us each day to keep our word to others and to be trustworthy, like our Father in heaven is trustworthy.

Adults' Prayer

God, you are truthful. Unlike us, you do not lie. Forgive us for the ways we have been untrue. Help us trust you and your promises. Help us believe they are true. Make us more like you, being truthful in all we say and do.

WEEK ONE *of* ADVENT

Background #2 — Jesus , a Branch from the Root of Jesse

Like us, Jesus was born with parents, grandparents, and great grandparents. In fact, Jesus' family line stretched all the way back to King David and even as far back as Abraham and Adam. Matthew (in Matt 1:1-17) makes a point of showing us who Jesus' family is because of the words of God in the book of Isaiah that spoke of Jesus as a "shoot from the stump of Jesse."

Isaiah 11:1-2

*1 There shall come forth a shoot from the stump of Jesse,
and a branch from his roots shall bear fruit.*

*2 And the Spirit of the LORD shall rest upon him,
the Spirit of wisdom and understanding,
the Spirit of counsel and might,
the Spirit of knowledge and the fear of the LORD.*

Shedding some light...

Have you ever watched a gardener working with her plants? Or have you ever picked up a piece of grass or a plant and seen the roots? Usually they are hidden but they are very important to the life of a plant or tree. Often we speak of our ancestors as our "family roots." Jesus had family roots as well, that were hidden in the soil of the Old Testament, which Matthew uproots to shows us. Why are Jesus' family roots important? Why does it matter that his line stretched back to King David, Abraham, and even Adam?

Children's Prayer

Dear God, You give plants roots so that they can be fed and stand tall. Help us to have roots that are planted in our families and in your word that we can be fed, grow healthy, and stand spiritually tall.

Adults' Prayer

Father of All Creation, when we think about your plan, the way you revealed it to your people generation after generation, the way you made promises that only you could keep and then kept them in ways that are far beyond our understanding, we are amazed. WEEK ONE of ADVENT

Background #3 – Mary and the Virgin Birth of a Boy Named Jesus.

When the angel Gabriel appeared in Nazareth, to the home of the woman who promised to marry Joseph (who was a descendant of David and Jesse), Mary was not expecting the visitor. The house was not cleaned nor a meal prepared. And she certainly didn't know how she was to bear a child who would take the throne of David! She was confused and troubled. Despite the unbelievable words of the angel, Mary submitted to God's wondrous plan for her life.

Isaiah 7:14

Behold, the virgin shall conceive and bear a son, and they shall call his name Immanuel.

Luke 1:26-38

26In the sixth month the angel Gabriel was sent from God to a city of Galilee named Nazareth, 27to a virgin betrothed to a man whose name was Joseph, of the house of David. And the virgin's name was Mary. 28And he came to her and said, "Greetings, O favored one, the Lord is with you!" 29But she was greatly troubled at the saying, and tried to discern what sort of greeting this might be. 30And the angel said to her, "Do not be afraid, Mary, for you have found favor with God. 31And behold, you will conceive in your womb and bear a son, and you shall call his name Jesus. 32He will be great and will be called the Son of the Most High. And the Lord God will give to him the throne of his father David, 33and he will reign over the house of Jacob forever, and of his kingdom there will be no end."

34And Mary said to the angel, "How will this be, since I am a virgin?"

35And the angel answered her, "The Holy Spirit will come upon you, and the power of the Most High will overshadow you; therefore the child to be born will be called holy—the Son of God. 36And behold, your relative Elizabeth in her old age has also conceived a son, and this is the sixth month with her who was called barren. 37For nothing will be impossible with God." 38And Mary said, "Behold, I am the servant of the Lord; let it be to me according to your word." And the angel departed from her.

Shedding some light...

Have your parents ever asked you to do something that didn't make sense? Have you ever been asked to believe something unbelievable? This takes a great amount of truth and faith. In this passage we see that God tells Mary she will do something that won't make sense and will have to believe something unbelievable. Because Mary loves God and trusts in his Word to her, she allows God to shape her life according to his plan. What do you think is the most unbelievable thing the angel told Mary? What part of the passage gives you hope?

Children's Prayer

Dear God, the story of Jesus and his family is amazing! Angels visited them. Angels told them some pretty amazing things. Yet they believed the unbelievable because they believed you. Thank you that Jesus' mother and father were so faithful in their love for you. Help us to love you and obey you by obeying our mother and father when they ask us to do things that honor you—even though we don't always understand the reasons they ask us to obey.

Adults' Prayer

Father, help us believe that nothing is impossible with you. Help us submit to you. Help us obey you. Let the way you fulfilled your promises in the past bolster our faith. Let us long for you to fulfill your promises in the future. And let us rest in the present, trusting in you and you alone.

WEEK ONE of ADVENT

Background #4 – Jesus’ Birth in the Small Town of Bethlehem

When the wise men showed up in Jerusalem inquiring where the Messiah was to be born, it got the whole place up in a tizzy. These were foreigners inquiring the whereabouts of the future King! How could foreigners know about the Messiah and the Jewish leaders not know? Everyone from King Herod to the religious leaders (chief priests and scribes) were greatly troubled. Herod quickly gathered the Jewish leadership together and asked them where the Messiah will be born. The Jewish leaders pulled out their scrolls and read from the prophet Micah (quoted in verse six below). They read that the Messiah would be born in the little town of Bethlehem. The king and religious leaders knew the right answers, but were too concerned with the threat to their own power to understand why the fulfillment of God’s promises were good news for the whole world!

Matthew 2:1-6

1Now after Jesus was born in Bethlehem of Judea in the days of Herod the king, behold, wise men from the east came to Jerusalem, 2saying, “Where is he who has been born king of the Jews? For we saw his star when it rose and have come to worship him.” 3When Herod the king heard this, he was troubled, and all Jerusalem with him; 4and assembling all the chief priests and scribes of the people, he inquired of them where the Christ was to be born. 5They told him, “In Bethlehem of Judea, for so it is written by the prophet:

*6“ ‘And you, O Bethlehem, in the land of Judah,
are by no means least among the rulers of Judah;
for from you shall come a ruler
who will shepherd my people Israel.’ ”*

Shedding some light...

Have you ever had the experience of finding yourself on the defensive on your own turf? What about when someone new shows up in your classroom? Or how about when a new employee arrives at work? Or how about when someone moves into your neighborhood that seems to know everything? We can be very protective of what we perceive as our own insider standing and knowledge! Why is that? What causes that? How can we overcome that temptation?

Children’s Prayer

Dear God, help us get excited when others get things we don’t get. Help us rejoice when other

people do well. When we don't get what we want, help us to believe that you give us everything that we need. Help us not get so frustrated by what we don't have that we can't be excited about what you are doing.

Adults' Prayer

Dear God, sometimes you speak to us from people that are strange and of no account. They seem to know more about us than we know of ourselves. Sometimes we also can look down on people who are not from places we value. Help us to love outsiders as we marvel in Jesus' humble beginnings.

WEEK ONE *of* ADVENT

Background #5 – Out of Egypt I Called My Son.

When King Herod heard about the coming Messiah from the traveling wise men he was very worried because the Messiah could become King and cast him from his throne. He was very jealous to guard his position, power, and reputation. So an angel came to warn Joseph and Mary that they should travel to Egypt for safety. When Joseph and Mary return to Israel it casts our thoughts to the journey of God's people out of slavery in Egypt to the promised land of Israel.

Matthew 2:13-15 (the quote in verse fifteen is from Hosea 11:1)

13Now when they had departed, behold, an angel of the Lord appeared to Joseph in a dream and said, "Rise, take the child and his mother, and flee to Egypt, and remain there until I tell you, for Herod is about to search for the child, to destroy him." 14And he rose and took the child and his mother by night and departed to Egypt 15and remained there until the death of Herod. This was to fulfill what the Lord had spoken by the prophet, "Out of Egypt I called my son."

Shedding some light...

The Lord cares for his people and his plan. We often struggle to believe in God on both counts. We doubt that he knows our struggles, and pain and we doubt that he has a plan for our life, much less for all of creation. But we see that not only is he aware of the thoughts and intentions of Herod, but he also has a specific plan for Joseph, Mary, and Jesus to go to Egypt until it is safe to return.

Children's Prayer

God, help us believe that you can take care of us. Help us believe that you know what is best for us. Help us stop worrying about what will happen today or tomorrow. And help us instead be at peace, trusting in you and your ability to care for us.

Adults' Prayer

Almighty God, we confess that we often doubt your goodness and protection. Instead of relying on you knowing all things and being able to do whatever you want, we fill our lives with anxiety and stress trying to vainly provide our own protection and comfort. In this season help us to grow in our faith and knowledge of you, your story, and your plan.

WEEK TWO *of* ADVENT

Character #1 – The Holy Spirit

The story of Jesus' birth is a wonderfully unique story in the history of humanity, and nothing shows us this more clearly than a brief look at the diverse cast of characters participated in this unrivalled event.

One of the first important characters to appear is the Holy Spirit. The same Spirit who moved over the waters of creation in Genesis I is now breathed into Mary to create the holy child. In this passage the "Most High" travels from the highest throne of heaven to visit his presence on the lowly home of Mary.

Luke 1: 34-38

34And Mary said to the angel, "How will this be, since I am a virgin?"

35And the angel answered her, "The Holy Spirit will come upon you, and the power of the Most High will overshadow you; therefore the child to be born will be called holy—the Son of God. 36And behold, your relative Elizabeth in her old age has also conceived a son, and this is the sixth month with her who was called barren. 37For nothing will be impossible with God." 38And Mary said, "Behold, I am the servant of the Lord; let it be to me according to your word." And the angel departed from her.

Shedding some light...

This story is one of the great miracles of the Bible. It is utterly beyond our comprehension to understand or fathom how Mary could become pregnant from God. Yet God did it. He descended from his heights of his holy home into the midst of our broken and fleshly humanity. Mary never looked for God to do this. She was astonished by the visit. God pursued her in his plan to keep his promise of redemption. Stop for a moment and slowly reread this well-known story. Allow yourself to be captured by this picture of the God who loves you! Be amazed by the work of Holy Spirit—in creation and in Mary. And then consider the work of Holy Spirit in your life and continue in your astonishment.

Children's Prayer:

God, help us see the ways you've helped us—even in the ways that we didn't expect it. And help us believe that you will still help us.

Wonderfully Wise God, we admit your ways are higher than ours and we fail in our ability to understand your great miracles on our behalf. Give us ears to hear and eyes to see so that we can marvel with Mary at the wonders of your son Jesus' birth. Don't let the familiarity of the story limit our amazement. Let us pause, consider, and be utterly astonished at what you did! Give us faith to believe what you can do—in us, in others, and in this world!

WEEK TWO of ADVENT

Character # 2 – The Star and the Wise Men

The heavens were deeply attuned to the coming of the Savior. The star signified that creation had a part to play in displaying God's good news to the people of the whole world. God even allowed pagan astrologers from the east to recognize the message of the star: that a king would be born in Judea. Yet even the wise men were surprised to find that the king was not in Jerusalem! God needed to speak his word to them directly for them to find the humble location of Jesus' birth. When they arrived at the house, they presented gifts fit for a king (Isa 60:5-7): gold, frankincense, and myrrh. After paying homage to this newborn king, they traveled back to their homes.

Matthew 2:1-12

*1*Now after Jesus was born in Bethlehem of Judea in the days of Herod the king, behold, wise men from the east came to Jerusalem, *2*saying, "Where is he who has been born king of the Jews? For we saw his star when it rose and have come to worship him." *3*When Herod the king heard this, he was troubled, and all Jerusalem with him; *4*and assembling all the chief priests and scribes of the people, he inquired of them where the Christ was to be born. *5*They told him, "In Bethlehem of Judea, for so it is written by the prophet:

6" 'And you, O Bethlehem, in the land of Judah,
are by no means least among the rulers of Judah;
for from you shall come a ruler
who will shepherd my people Israel.' "

*7*Then Herod summoned the wise men secretly and ascertained from them what time the star had appeared. *8*And he sent them to Bethlehem, saying, "Go and search diligently for the child, and when you have found him, bring me word, that I too may come and worship him." *9*After listening to the king, they went on their way. And behold, the star that they had seen when it rose went before them until it came to rest over the place where the child was. *10*When they saw the star, they rejoiced exceedingly with great joy.

*11*And going into the house they saw the child with Mary his mother, and they fell down and worshiped him. Then, opening their treasures, they offered him gifts, gold and frankincense and myrrh. *12*And being warned in a dream not to return to Herod, they departed to their own country by another way.

Shedding some light...

This story is about outsiders being invited to participate as insiders in the birth of Jesus. God uses the star to communicate the story of Jesus to those who are outside the covenant family of Israel and his written word. He doesn't just bring them as far as Jerusalem and then leave them hanging. He leads them into the very presence of Christ, where they can bring their gifts of tithe and worship. This is an amazing picture of all the nations bringing their gifts before the Lamb of God and a wonderful anticipation of the day when all the nations will worship Jesus as the King of Kings and Lord of Lords. It also models and inspires us as we think about bringing our talents, gifts, and worship to Jesus during this season of Advent. Spend some time talking about what God has given you and how you can use those things to worship him.

Children's Prayer

God, everything we have has comes from you. You have given us more than we deserve to get. Help us be thankful for what we have and help us be generous with what you have given us.

Adults' Prayer

Eternal King, when we look out upon your creation we marvel at your wondrous works and rejoice at their beauty. We are amazed at the ways your creation points us to you. We realize though, Lord, that we marvel in light of how you have revealed yourself in the Bible. May we seek in this season to know the depths and wonders of your "good news" ever more deeply so that we can share in the praises of all the nations.

Character #3 – The Angel and the Heavenly Host

To show how significant the birth of Jesus is, we are given a glimpse of the angelic host only rivaled by the visions of John in the book of Revelation. Jesus' birth is a cataclysmic in-breaking of God's kingdom into the earthly realm. This is a visual picture of the Lord's prayer, "Thy Kingdom come." We can almost imagine how shocked the shepherds must have been as the glory of the Lord shone around them!

Luke 2:8-20

8And in the same region there were shepherds out in the field, keeping watch over their flock by night. 9And an angel of the Lord appeared to them, and the glory of the Lord shone around them, and they were filled with fear. 10And the angel said to them, "Fear not, for behold, I bring you good news of great joy that will be for all the people. 11For unto you is born this day in the city of David a Savior, who is Christ the Lord. 12And this will be a sign for you: you will find a baby wrapped in swaddling cloths and lying in a manger." 13And suddenly there was with the angel a multitude of the heavenly host praising God and saying,

*14"Glory to God in the highest,
and on earth peace among those with whom he is pleased!"*

15When the angels went away from them into heaven, the shepherds said to one another, "Let us go over to Bethlehem and see this thing that has happened, which the Lord has made known to us." 16And they went with haste and found Mary and Joseph, and the baby lying in a manger. 17And when they saw it, they made known the saying that had been told them concerning this child. 18And all who heard it wondered at what the shepherds told them. 19But Mary treasured up all these things, pondering them in her heart. 20And the shepherds returned, glorifying and praising God for all they had heard and seen, as it had been told them.

Shedding some light...

God spares no expense at the announcement of Jesus' birth. He enlists not just a heavenly quartet, or a single shimmering soloist, but the whole heavenly throng, singing together as a big, heavenly gospel choir, rocking the foundations of humanity. The angels' message is simple and straightforward and not in the least bit clouded in celestial language or heavenly rhetoric. "Good News! The Savior is born!" with a chorus of "Glory to God" and "Peace on Earth." Talk about what the angels said and why those were the words they used to announce Jesus' birth.

Children's Prayer

Dear Heavenly God, give us the same sense of joy and excitement as the angels who proclaimed Jesus' birth.

Adults' Prayer

Almighty God, when we find our hearts distracted in the busy-ness of this Christmas season, enamor us with the glory and joy of your presence. Let us understand why the birth of Jesus was "good news of great joy."

Character # 4 – The Shepherds

Like the three wise men from far-off lands, the shepherds in their fields were unlikely candidates in the hierarchy of Jewish leadership to be the first to hear of this great king's birth. Yet God chose the foolish things of the world to shame the wise. It is not unlikely that in this scene with the angelic host we are reminded of who Jesus is: our great shepherd.

The shepherds were not a highly regarded group of people, and their field was certainly a peculiar spot to unveil this grand message delivered by an angel host in all of its rehearsed splendor! The Christmas story continues to impress upon us that every bit of Jesus' story shatters the pomp and circumstance of the world. Humble scenes, cultural outcasts, and foreign visitors all receive front row tickets to the birth. In the bright lights and over-the-top window displays of Christmas, we need to rethink where to look to find Jesus. He was first found with the broken, the destitute, and the humble.

Children's Prayer

Jesus, as we celebrate your birth, help us not only think about ourselves, but help us also think about others. Help us think about our friends, our family, and those in need. And help us love them and serve them in a way that is pleasing to you.

Adults' Prayer

Dear Father, we so often forget the true beginnings of Jesus. We get so easily distracted by the desires and flash of the world. Help us to take time to practice humility and care, both for our own struggles and brokenness, as well as those around us in need.

Singing the Story #1 – The Song of Zechariah (The Benedictus)

You can imagine Zechariah, after nine months of being unable to speak, opening his mouth to prophecy after the birth of his son. In this piece of prophetic poetry, he uses Old Testament language to express how God is worthy of praise because he has acted according to his promises (Gen 22:16-18) to deliver his people through a descendant of David. In the second part of the song (verses 76-79) Zechariah addresses his newly born child, with literary allusions to Isa 40:3 and Mal 3:1.

Luke 1: 68-79

*68Blessed be the Lord God of Israel,
for he has visited and redeemed his people
69and has raised up a horn of salvation for us
in the house of his servant David,
70as he spoke by the mouth of his holy prophets from of old,

When we sing the songs of Advent, in many ways we are singing the song of Zechariah. We are singing songs founded on the images and promises of hope and expectation. By the time of Zechariah the Jewish people hadn't heard from a true prophet of God in four hundred years. (Knowing this, you can start to understand Zechariah's hard heart in the face of Gabriel's message of good news.) For us, it has been over two thousand years since we have heard from the living Jesus. Every year we remember his birth, and the advent of the good news of his work. As we remember, we also hunger and long for him to return to complete the work of redemption in our lives and in the created world.

Children's Prayer



Singing the Story #2 – The Song of Mary (The Magnificat)

Mary stands in an illustrious line of biblical women who have praised the Lord in song. Miriam was the first, who after the destruction of Pharaoh's army and the crossing of the Red Sea recounted in song the heroic event (Exodus 15). Deborah rejoiced in the Lord's power to free his people from oppression (Judges 5). Hannah praised the Lord in song when the Lord bestowed his gift of a child upon her (1 Sam 2:1-10). These images of victory and blessing are intertwined beautifully in Mary's song, which is known as the "The Magnificat."

this week and allow it to shape your words and heart of praise. And then consider again Mary's song. What does her song tell you about God? In what ways can her words find an echo in your praise?

Dear Father, when we meditate on these words, we share in the feelings of Mary's own unworthiness for your love and grace in our lives. Father, give us true humility and hunger for your Son's praise.

They hardly seem scary, or the type of characters that would frighten hardened shepherds. Yet this multitude broke through the heavenly curtain and with regal precision proclaimed in swift accord the present situation.

9And an angel of the Lord appeared to them, and the glory of the Lord shone around them, and they were filled with fear. 10And the angel said to them, "Fear not, for behold, I bring you good news of great joy that will be for all the people. 11For unto you is born this day in the city of David a Savior, who is Christ the Lord. 12And this will be a sign for you: you will find a baby wrapped in swaddling cloths and lying in a manger." 13And suddenly there was with the angel a multitude of the heavenly host praising God and saying,

*14"Glory to God in the highest,
and on earth peace among those with whom he is pleased!"*

Shedding some light...

The heavenly band of angels was an angelic 'host' or literally an army of angels. They came to announce peace, but also to signify that God's enemies would be destroyed through this coming Savior, Christ the Lord. Give praise to God, who sits on the highest throne of heaven and brings peace on earth for those who bear his favor.

Children's Prayer

Great and Powerful God, there is nothing you cannot do. No one can stop what you plan to do. Nothing can get in your way. Thank you for using that power to defeat your enemies.

Adults' Prayer

Dear Majestic God, you spared no expense in securing peace for us. You took your son from a swaddling babe to a crucifixion and destroyed sin and death for us. May we carry on about Jesus as the angels did, filling our lives with songs of praise to him, our Savior and Lord.

Singing the Story #4 – The Song of Simeon (Nunc Dimittis)

This song captures Simeon's gratitude to God. It also captures Simeon's readiness to die. Yet, it is sung in joy because Simeon has seen the promise fulfilled. It is a wonderful song that captures both God's desire to extend redemption to the whole world, as well as a blessing with a caveat: this child will cause both the rise and fall of many in Israel.

Luke 2: 22-35

22And when the time came for their purification according to the Law of Moses, they brought him up to Jerusalem to present him to the Lord 23(as it is written in the Law of the Lord, "Every male who first opens the womb shall be called holy to the Lord") 24and to offer a sacrifice according to what is said in the Law of the Lord, "a pair of turtledoves, or two young pigeons." 25Now there was a man in Jerusalem, whose name was Simeon, and this man was righteous and devout, waiting for the consolation of Israel, and the Holy Spirit was upon him. 26And it had been revealed to him by the Holy Spirit that he would not see death before he had seen the Lord's Christ. 27And he came in the Spirit into the temple, and when the parents brought in the child Jesus, to do for him according to the custom of the Law, 28he took him up in his arms and blessed God and said,

*29"Lord, now you are letting your servant depart in peace,
according to your word;*

30for my eyes have seen your salvation

31that you have prepared in the presence of all peoples,

*32a light for revelation to the Gentiles,
and for glory to your people Israel.*

33And his father and his mother marveled at what was said about him. 34And Simeon blessed them and said to Mary his mother, "Behold, this child is appointed for the fall and rising of many in Israel, and for a sign that is opposed 35(and a sword will pierce through your own soul also), so that thoughts from many hearts may be revealed."

Shedding some light...

In the gospel message there is an intertwined narrative of judgment as well as of salvation. Simeon illustrates that Jesus will be both a great light to the Gentiles, as well as a sword that would pierce our hearts. We can never experience the joy of Jesus without first facing the sinful thoughts and actions of our own hearts. Part of the good news of the gospel is

that it helps us understand the horror of our sin as we find ourselves in the arms of our loving Savior.

Children's Prayer

Dear God, thank you for forgiving our sins and helping us become more like Jesus.

Adults' Prayer

Dear Father, you sent us Jesus, the true light of the world. Yet we have often desired to hide in darkness rather than live in the revealing light of your Spirit. Give us eyes that see our sin and dwell on your salvation.

The Darker Side of Christmas #1 – The Scandal of Jesus’ Genealogy

If you actually take the time to read through the list of names in Jesus genealogy you find four very unusual names present for a typical genealogy. Matthew lists four women whose own background was either Gentile (non-Jewish), scandalous, or both! You can read the texts yourself to get the full picture: Tamar (Genesis 38), Rahab (Joshua 6), Ruth (Ruth 4), and Bathsheba (2 Samuel II), who isn’t even listed by name.

Shedding some light...

Matthew creates a historical snapshot of Jesus' family line where each name is carefully chosen. It's hard to say for sure why he includes these women... they were both infamous characters and examples of people outside of the Jewish family on whom God lavished his grace. Overall you should get the impression that Jesus is the fulfillment of both God's promises to the patriarchs of the faith (Abraham and David) as well as fulfilling his promise to declare salvation to all kinds of people from all the nations!

The Darker Side of Christmas #2 – The Disbelief of Zechariah

Men have never had much success winning a quarrel with the angels. It got Jacob a dislocated hip and Zechariah struck dumb. In response to Gabriel's incredible speech about a son that will be born to him, a son who will be great before the Lord, and will bring joy and gladness to many souls, Zechariah, a man that served God with his whole life, finds a quick word of disbelief falling easily from his lips.

Zechariah's mind should have been cast back to the faithful women of the Old Testament who gave birth when they were "advanced in years" because of the goodness of the Lord. Instead he is struck dumb and exits the temple waving his arms like a fool. His wife Elizabeth (as we read a few verses later), has a much godlier response to the work of the Lord on her behalf.

Luke 1:8-23

8Now while he was serving as priest before God when his division was on duty, 9according to the custom of the priesthood, he was chosen by lot to enter the temple of the Lord and burn incense. 10And the whole multitude of the people were praying outside at the hour of incense. 11And there appeared to him an angel of the Lord standing on the right side of the altar of incense.

12And Zechariah was troubled when he saw him, and fear fell upon him. 13But the angel said to him, "Do not be afraid, Zechariah, for your prayer has been heard, and your wife Elizabeth will bear you a son, and you shall call his name John. 14And you will have joy and gladness, and many will rejoice at his birth, 15for he will be great before the Lord. And he must not drink wine or strong drink, and he will be filled with the Holy Spirit, even from his mother's womb. 16And he will turn many of the children of Israel to the Lord their God, 17and he will go before him in the spirit and power of Elijah, to turn the hearts of the fathers to the children, and the disobedient to the wisdom of the just, to make ready for the Lord a people prepared."

The Darker Side of Christmas #3 – To Divorce Her Quietly

Even in the midst of these tremendous stories of God’s miraculous power in the birth of Jesus, we find that the humanity of the other characters remains transparent. Both Matthew and Luke want us to know that from the very beginning Jesus’ story is fraught with trials and sufferings. Even in the midst of Mary finding out she is pregnant with a child from the Holy Spirit, Matthew tells us that Joseph considered divorcing her silently, assuming that she has committed adultery, a sin punishable by death. Committed adultery—in the midst of their betrothal to be married! This is pretty scandalous stuff to be published in what we often see portrayed as the pristine birth of shiny baby Jesus.

Matthew 1:18-20

18Now the birth of Jesus Christ took place in this way. When his mother Mary had been betrothed to Joseph, before they came together she was found to be with child from the Holy Spirit. 19And her husband Joseph, being a just man and unwilling to put her to shame, resolved to divorce her quietly. 20But as he considered these things, behold, an angel of the Lord appeared to him in a dream, saying, “Joseph, son of David, do not fear to take Mary as your wife, for that which is conceived in her is from the Holy Spirit.”

Shedding some light...

This scene reminds us of the stress, humanity, and conflict of our own lives. The holiday season is a time that emerges to us in both the blessings of family life and the pain of family dysfunction. Even as the Lord speaks to Joseph, we need the Lord to speak into our relationships so that they too can reflect his hope and power.

Father God, help us to love our family well.

Adults’ Prayer

Dear Father, we are so thankful that you speak into not only our own lives, but into our families and spiritual communities. Forgive us for the ways we seek to arrogantly stay independent. Forgive us for the anger we feel and conflicts that arise when people don’t give us what we want. Continue to speak into our relationships—bringing honesty, hope, humility, and healing. The Darker Side of Christmas #4 – Herod and the Infants of Bethlehem

The story of Herod and the infants of Bethlehem is a horrific episode of the birth narrative that is almost universally absent from Sunday school accounts of the story. Yet it is fundamental to understanding the hope that is present in Jesus' birth. Here is one who will finally lead his people from slavery and persecution to the Promised Land. God wants to show that this infant born in a manger is uniting himself to the history of God's struggling people.

The story, in itself, casts shadows of Pharaoh's slaughter of the Israelite children in Egypt (Exodus 1:22), and Matthew helps us remember the children of Rachel who were killed by the Babylonians when they plundered Israel into exile (Jer 31:15-17). Yet even in Rachel's inconsolable grief, God promises future hope and for his child Israel in his son Jesus.

Matthew 2:16-18

16Then Herod, when he saw that he had been tricked by the wise men, became furious, and he sent and killed all the male children in Bethlehem and in all that region who were two years old or under, according to the time that he had ascertained from the wise men.

17Then was fulfilled what was spoken by the prophet Jeremiah:

*18“A voice was heard in Ramah,
weeping and loud lamentation,
Rachel weeping for her children;
she refused to be comforted, because they are no more.*

Shedding some light...

In Herod we see an evil king whose rule and power is threatened by one who is divinely appointed to rule. Jesus is the king who will bring a new relationship between God and man and will lead his people to true salvation and victory. In the face of insurmountable evil and sorrow, we see God working his purposes to heal, restore, and renew hope... a hope that will be ultimately secured and anchored in the cross and resurrection. As you feel the sorrow present in evil and suffering, grieve. But grieve with hope, for a new day has

dawned.

The Birth of Jesus Christ

Luke 2:1-7

Shedding some light...

It all seems so simple and ordinary: An imperial edict, a pregnant teenager, a soon-to-be husband, and a town full of people simply following the law of the land. Ordinary events of history, ordained by God as part of the greatest miracle in the history of the world: The Son of God being born as a child in the city of David. And it all happened when “the time came.”

In Galatians 4:4-5 Paul writes, “*But when the fullness of time had come, God sent forth his Son, born of woman, born under the law, to redeem those who were under the law, so that we might receive adoption as sons.*” The God who rules history, entered our history, to claim us and all our tomorrows as his own.

This Christmas morning, join the Apostle Paul as he proclaims the gloriousness of the gospel (Gal 3:16):

Great indeed, we confess, is the mystery of godliness:

*He was manifested in the flesh,
vindicated by the Spirit,
seen by angels,
proclaimed among the nations,
believed on in the world,
taken up in glory.*

And join the Apostle John as he prays in response to Jesus’ proclamation, “*Surely I am coming soon,*” with the following: “*Amen. Come, Lord Jesus!*” (Rev 22:20).
